# BEST EVENT: CAPODANNO! THE FLORENTINE NEW YEAR AND THE FEAST OF THE ANNUNCIATION, March 25

It's time to celebrate! Still today, Florence celebrates a special New Year's Tradition on March 25th at Piazza della Santissima Annunziata. Until 1750, the beginning of the calendar year would fall on March 25, roughly coinciding with the arrival of spring. This date is also the day of Christ's conception with the Annunciation of the Angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary, exactly nine months before the birth of Jesus. Although the Gregorian calendar was introduced in 1502, the Florentines have held to their tradition and continue to celebrate Capodanno Fiorentino on March 25th. Between 1250 and 1750, Florentines would gather at the Church of the Santissima Annunziata, where there is a famous medieval mural of the Annunciation. According to legend, the artist fell asleep having completed everything on the mural except for the face of the Madonna. When he awoke, the face of the Virgin Mary had been completed for him by angelic masters. And so, even today, citizens and authorities come on this day to pay tribute to the Madonna. ### BEST TRADITION: THE EASTER HOLIDAY AND EVENTS, March 28-April 1

(From: <u>DiscoverTuscany.com</u>) If you're giving up your vices for Lent, the end is in sight. Easter in Italy is not a short celebration but rather, celebrated over five days starting the Thursday before Easter Sunday and finishing the following Monday. It starts with a wide range of religious and folkloric events then ends with colourfully wrapped chocolate eggs with hidden surprises and picnics in the countryside. There is a wide range of things to do in Florence on Easter Sunday and Monday as well as in the surrounding areas. Easter in Tuscany for many signals the beginning of spring, with its colourful blossoms and mild temperatures. The event is also synonymous with parades recreating events from the Crusades, revocations of religious events, elaborate floral decorations in churches like that in San Casciano and many folkloric festivals. # BEST PARADE AND HISTORICAL EVENT: SCOPPIO DEL CARRO ON EASTER SUNDAY, March 31

The annual Easter tradition dating back to the First Crusade! The Scoppio del Carro, The Explosion of the Cart. Marking both Easter and Spring, the ignition of the cart guarantees good crops, a successful harvest, stable civic life and bountiful trade, as well as signifying the passage of new holy fire to light those extinguished on Good Friday.

A thirty-foot carved and painted wooden cart (the present version is over 150 years old) is pulled by flower-bedecked white oxen from Porta al Prato to Piazza del Duomo. A very special Easter Sunday mass is held, a ritual that includes one of the best daytime fireworks displays in the world. It was during the pontificate of Leo X (Giovanni de'Medici, 1513-1521), that the 'colombina' - a mechanical bird shaped like a dove with an olive branch in its beak, representing the Holy Spirit - was used for the first time. During the singing of the Gloria of the Easter Mass, the deacon lights a holy fire, kindled from three historic stone chips that were obtained during the crusades of 1099 from the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. The colombina 'flies' down a line through the open doors of the cathedral, where the Holy Fire is used to light a fuse attached to the dove. It flies back to the cart where it ignites the explosion, erupting fireworks into the Easter sky, as well as plumes of purple smoke - the colour of Florence. Piazza del Duomo, The Procession starts at 10.00, and The Explosion of the Cart is at 11.00

# BEST EXHIBITION: LAST CHANCE TO SEE MAPPLETHORPE - VON GLOEDEN. BEAUTY AND DESIRE, ON DISPLAY AT MUSEO NOVECENTO, Until March 6

From September 23 to February 14, 2024, the Museo Novecento pays tribute to one of the most significant figures in 20th-century photography, Robert Mapplethorpe, in a unique comparison with the photographs of Wilhelm von Gloeden and a selection of photographs from the Alinari Archive. The exhibition is the second major exhibition of this museum dedicated to photography, a practice that has revolutionized the history of art since the 19th century. "Beauty and Desire" draws inspiration from a series of artworks that highlights Mapplethorpe's intense artistic production, emphasizing the connection between his work and classical aesthetics, as well as his sculptural approach to photography, which is evident in his studies of both male and female nudes and still life, equating bodies with objects in a sculptor's vision and sensibility. #### FESTA DELLA DONNA, March 8

Shower the streets in yellow! March 8 is celebrated as International Women's Day, and in Italy it is known as the Festa della Donna. get ready for spring colour because the symbol is the bright yellow mimosa flower. Fifteen million bunches of mimosa are bought each year to honour the women of Italy. It was the idea of Teresa Mattei, a partisan in WWII, who held the rank of Company Commander in the Garibaldi Youth Front. It was proposed that violets be the flower, but she said it should be a flower readily available to all, even the poorest of the poor, growing wild in March all over the country. She was the youngest person elected to the Constitutional Assembly after the war and was also the national leader of the Union of Italian Women. ### FESTA DEL PAPA (OR, FOR THE TUSCANS) FESTA DEL BABBO, March 19

(Text from: <u>visitflorence.com</u>) All of Italy refers to the father figure as papà, in fact it is only in Tuscany that they use the word Babbo (even Pinocchio, born in Collodi Tuscany, used this endearment when talking to his father). Italy celebrates all fathers/papà/babbo on the holy day dedicated to San Giuseppe (St. Joseph) which is March 19th. So give your Dad a hug (or a call, if he isn't with you in Tuscany now) and head over to the pastry shops which will be filled with "fritelle", fried dough and rice balls covered in sugar.

### 8th EDITION OF BLACK HISTORY MONTH FLORENCE, Until March

Black History Month Florence is a cross institutional network for Black cultural production that celebrates the diversity of Afro-descendent Cultures in the context of Italy. The initiative is engaged in programming, advising and co-promoting over 50 events annually within the month of February, through a network formed and supported by the Comune, foundations, institutions, cultural associations, museums, schools and venues dedicated to art and to music. Black History Month Florence is a community dedicated to challenging flattened narratives about African and African Diasporic cultures and disseminating culturally diverse programming. # **EXHIBITIONS**

# REPOSE AND RESIST: A BLACK HISTORY MONTH FLORENCE EXHIBITION AT M.A.D., THE MURATE ART DISTRICT, until March 30

The collective exhibition, curated by Black History Month Florence, examines the concepts of rest and healing in relation to Afro-descendant cultural production. The exhibition brings together a group of international artists and is enriched by a documentary film made by Bradly Dever Treadaway in relation to a retreat, from which the exhibition takes its name, held in Giverny, France, following a collaboration between The Recovery Plan and the Terra Foundation for American Art. #### ROBERT INNOCENTI ON SHOW AT PALAZZO MEDICI RICCIARDI, Until March 26

"I get lost when dealing with words; instead, images are my world" - Roberto Innocenti, the only Italian illustrator awarded the Hans Christian Andersen Award (2008), is the protagonist of the exhibition at Palazzo Medici Riccardi. The exhibition offers visitors the opportunity to delve deeper into Innocenti's work between the 20th and 21st centuries through his paintings rich in detail and innovative in their overall visual impact. His unmistakable style, characterized by the clarity of perspective typical of the Florentine tradition and a modern cinematic vision, invites the reader to explore a world that appears more real than ours. ### ANSELM KIEFER ON SHOW AT PALAZZO STROZZI, Until July

Palazzo Strozzi presents a major exhibition dedicated to one of the greatest masters of the 20th and 21st century art, Anselm Kiefer. The exhibition allows direct contact with the art of the German artist thorough new and historical works that engage in a profound dialogue with the Renaissance architecture of Palazzo Strozzi, including a new work especially created for the palace's internal courtyard. Fallen Angel is a journey that reflects on topics such as identity, history, and philosophy. Through painting, sculpture, installation and photography, Kiefer's art offers deep introspection into the human condition, in a complex weaving of connections between the past, present and future. ### DIVINA SIMULACRA AT THE GALLERIE DEGLI UFFIZI, Until June

The main statues of the ancient Medici collection are now on display on the ground floor of the Uffizi. The Uffizi's most beautiful ancient statues on display in the rooms of the Vasari Museum: in these spacious rooms, visitors will be able to see and admire them up close, in all their beauty. This is the great exhibition 'Divina Simulacra. Masterpieces of Classical Sculpture from the Gallery'. On display for the first time are individual replicas of classical marble groups that, in the historical setting, are located in different places in the Gallery. Website.

#### ART NOUVEAU ON DISPLAY AT THE MUSEO DEGLI INNOCENTI, Until April 2024

The first exhibition in Florence dedicated to Alphonse Mucha, the most important Czech artist, father of Art Nouveau and creator of iconic images. In the late 19th and early 20th century, Paris was considered the capital of art world. It was the period of the so-called Belle Époque, there was great enthusiasm, and Alphonse Mucha, also thanks to his meeting with Sara Bernhardt, became the most famous and disputed artist of the time. His works, illustrations, theatre posters and nascent advertising became available to all. It is to this exceptional artist that Arthemisia and the Museo degli Innocenti are dedicating the upcoming great Florentine exhibition. Website.

#### STARRY NIGHT IMMERSIVE CONCERTS AT THE CATTEDRALE DELL'IMMAGINE

#### ALICE IN WONDERLAND AT TEATRO VERDI

The 'Teatro Pagliano' assumed its current name, 'Teatro Verdi,' in 1901. It was built during the Grand Ducal period in Florence on the former site of the fourteenth century Stinche Prison. This month enjoy Alice in Wonderland: A great literary classic in an all-Tuscan edition: the musical features a cast of 15 exceptional performers and will make adults and children relive the emotions and continuous surprises that only Wonderland can offer. The engaging music, with over forty wonderful hand-sewn costumes and the spectacular sets all set the stage for an unforgettable show.

#### MAGGIO MUSICALE FIORENTINO

The Theatre of the Maggio Musicale Fiorentino owes its name to the prestigious Maggio Musicale Festival, the oldest in Italy, a first that it shares in Europe with the festivals of Salzburg and Bayreuth. Founded in Florence in 1933, the festival quickly became a centre of dissemination of the great European musical culture indicating and proposing new and unconventional ideas, in regards to classical repertoire and contemporary compositions.
